Co-founder of the artist collective **The Propeller Group**; former board member of **San Art** in Ho Chi Minh City

Earned a BFA from the University of California, Irvine in 1999, and an MFA from the California Institute of the Arts in 2004

Vietnamese-American artist known for collaborating with communities and researching sites of trauma often associated with colonialism, war and displacement. Nguyen poignantly loops and weaves together memory, history and the present to speculate possible futures.

WHY USE UNEXPLODED ORDNANCE (UXO) IN HIS SCULPTURES?

Quang Tri in Vietnam is one of the most heavily bombed sites in all of human history. Vietnam is no longer at war but its people are still losing their limbs and lives from the UXO* in the country. Nguyen believes materials hold memories. What was meant to kill and destroy has been transformed and renewed into something that represents hope and healing. Each of the mobiles has been tuned to frequencies that promote healing and resonates with a deep sound.



^{*} UXO: unexploded ordnance (bombs, shells, grenades, land mines, and others) from war that still pose a risk of detonation

WHY IS ALEXANDER CALDER REFERENCED IN THE WORK?

Nguyet, the female protagonist in the speculative fictional film The Unburied Sounds of a Troubled Horizon, buys and sells bomb scraps in Quang Tri. She makes hanging mobiles from UXO and after finding a magazine with images of works by Calder, she believes she is the reincarnation of the American sculptor. Calder made prints, posters and buttons to support Presidential candidates against the war. He joined marches and even took out advertisements in national US media to protest the American involvement in Vietnam. That Calder worked primarily with metal also lent itself well to Nguyet's story of working in a scrap metal yard. Calder's mobiles are well known to people outside of the art world so the general public would be able to recognize his work more readily. Calder passed away in 1976 – one year after the war ended.



If I were a bomb ready to explode, if I have become dangerous to your life, then you must take care of me. You think you can get away from me, but how? I am here, right in your midst. (You cannot remove me from your life.) And I may explode at any time. I need your care. I need your time. I need you to defuse me.


You are responsible for me, because you have made the vow (and I heard it) to love and to care. I know that to take care of me you need much patience, much coolness. I realize that in you there is also a bomb to be defused. So why don't we help each other? I need you to listen to me. No one has listened to me. No one understands my suffering, including the ones who say they love me. The pain inside of me is suffocating me. It is the TNT that makes up the bomb. There is no one else who will listen to me.

That is why I need you. But you seem to be getting away from me. You want to run for your safety, the kind of safety that does not exist. I have not created my own bomb. It is you. It is society. It is family. It is school. It is tradition. So please don't blame me for it. Come and help, if not, I will explode. This is not a threat. It is only a plea for help. I will also be of help when it is your turn.





In the Art of Tuan Andrew Nguyen, Vietnam's Nightmares Live On

One of the wisest, most beautiful and unsettling exhibitions in New York this summer is "Tuan Andrew Nguyen: Radiant Remembrance" at the New Museum, a show about coming to terms with the intergenerational trauma of war. Nguyen works in video and also makes art objects pertaining to them. In the three recent moving-image installations here he creates narratives that operate in cinematic and real space in different, often affecting ways.

Nguyen was born in Saigon, Vietnam, in 1976, and came to the United States with his family three years later. His family lived in Oklahoma, Texas and Southern California, where he earned a B.A. and an M.F. A. Revisiting Vietnam as a young man, he came to see the country and its trials as the primary subject of his art; in 2005 he moved to Ho Chi Minh City, where he continues to live and work.

Nguyen is a documentarian and an assembler of broken things with a preference for collaboration. His work aims to heal the fragmented lives and retrieve the suppressed memories of the marginalized people most affected by colonization, war and displacement, especially in Vietnam.

The artist's first major exhibition in an American museum, "Radiant Remembrance," has been organized by Vivian Crockett, a curator at the museum, and Ian Wallace, a curatorial assistant. Its video installations focus on people who live in the shadow of the Tuấn Andrew Nguyễn



Princeton University Art Museum Announces Six Site-Specific Artworks for New Building Opening in 2025

PRINCETON, NJ – Today the Princeton University Art Museum announced the contemporary artists selected for four large-scale commissions and two acquisitions that will be integrated into the architecture and surrounding landscape of the Museum's new building. Opening in 2025, the new building will nearly double the Museum's previous size and embody its long-standing commitment to the thoughtful and equitable display and study of the globe-spanning collections under its care.

The celebrated American artist and educator **Nick Cave** will create a monumental and colorful installation of mosaic tile, gold bronze, and wood to welcome visitors to the Museum. Incorporated directly onto two sides of the building's covered entrance court, this work derives from

Museum's east terrace. The sculpture draws on the artist's research into Princeton's collections of ancient art and archival photographs of excavation sites. Inspired by these collections, Al-Hadid's sculpture hints at the ancient knowledge that exists within the Museum's contemporary walls. The result will incorporate figural and mosaic elements and a complex aluminum structure.

To fill a vertical space created by one of the building's signature lens windows, the multidisciplinary artist **Tuan Andrew Nguyen** has built a kinetic sculpture composed of metal from unexploded landmines and artillery shells left behind during the Vietnam War—a reference to colonial violence that belies the tranquility of the gallery space. The work will be placed in dialogue with an ancient Roman mosaic featuring the head of Medusa, the figure from Greek mythology whose hideous appearance would turn a viewer to stone.

Making Art Out of Bombshells and Memories in Vietnam

Tuan Andrew Nguyen's videos and sculptures uncover haunting artifacts and stories from the Vietnam War. They're coming soon to the New Museum.

Not quite 20 minutes into <u>"The Unburied Sounds of a Troubled</u> <u>Horizon,"</u> a film by the artist <u>Tuan Andrew Nguyen</u>, the camera settles on a distinctive-looking monument at the far end of a wooden footbridge. We're in <u>Quang Tri province</u>, central Vietnam. The <u>bridge spans the Ben Hai River</u>, which for 21 years, from the French debacle at Dien Bien Phu in 1954 to the fall of Saigon in 1975, was the demarcation line between North and South Vietnam. A couple of miles in either direction was the so-called Demilitarized Zone, a "buffer" that became one of the mostbombed places on the planet.

This reconstructed footbridge was the tenuous link that connected warring halves of the divided country. The postwar monument at its southern end is called Desire for National Reunification, but the tragic reality of this place is that it is so littered with unexploded shells that anyone who ventures beyond a few well-worn paths risks being blown apart. Memories fade but the trauma survives, not just in peoples' minds but in the land they inhabit.

"Unburied Sounds" is the centerpiece of "Tuan Andrew Nguyen: Radiant Remembrance," set to open at the New Museum in Manhattan on June 29 — less than a month after he was awarded the 2023 Joan Miro Prize in Barcelona. It will be his first major solo museum exhibition in the United States. The last time he was in a leading American art institution, six years ago, was with the Propeller Group, the Ho Chi Minh City-based collective that captured the art world's attention even as the trio was on the verge

Working in Saigon, Nguyen suspends military ordnance in mobile webs of sound and form. He reflects on the physical demands of metalworking and what it means to use objects and materials with a capacity to hold and subvert time, narrative and identity.

Livia Russell Can you talk about your new work for Frieze Seoul?

Tuan Andrew Nguyen I'm working on a large sculpture. It will be a suspended, circular piece, about three metres in diameter, comprising various kinetic elements, some of which are cast from bomb metal found in Quang Tri, one of the areas in Vietnam that is still dealing with an extraordinary amount of UXO (unexploded ordnance) buried in the land. I'm imagining a fragmented sun. An explosion of sorts. There will be some bells tuned to 432Hz and other sound elements. Other sculptures in this body of work have deliberately focused on exposing the raw material of the metal and brass, but I'm excited to play with colour in this one.

There's also a series of 57mm ballistic shells found in Quang Tri. These shells have been turned into bells, almost like a wind chime, with a mobile element hung from the bell that acts as a wind catcher. The mobile element harks back to Alexander Calder and his fictional reincarnation, who appears in a

Galerie Quynh Wins the 2024 Frieze Seoul Stand Prize

An international jury of directors and curators awarded the Ho Chi Minh City-based gallery for its solo presentation by Tuan Andrew Nguyen



The Ho Chi Minh City-based gallery Galerie Quynh is the winner of the 2024 Frieze Seoul Stand Prize in recognition of their solo booth featuring an installation by Vietnamese-American artist <u>Tuan</u> <u>Andrew Nguyen</u>.

Nguyen's presentation was selected by a jury of institutional directors and curators comprising Christopher Lew, Wassan Al-Khudhairi and Victoria Sung.

About Galerie Quynh's Presentation

Tuan Andrew Nguyen's solo show at the fair comprises new sculptures related to his film *The Unburied Sounds of a Troubled Horizon* (2022).

The film explores the legacy effects of UXO (unexploded ordnance) in Quang Tri, Vietnam – the world's most heavily bombed region in the history of human warfare. The film weaves historical tragedy with the imaginative powers of art and the possibilities of reincarnation to explore ways of transformative healing. The film was presented in Tuan's solo show at The New Museum (New York) in 2023, along with sculptures related to the film.

Galerie Quyh's booth displays sculptures created out of brass artillery shell casings and tuned to different healing frequencies. The large sculpture is played at intervals during the fair.

Gagosian will land in Seoul with a presentation of Maurizio Cattelan, Nam June Paik and Derrick Adams. The gallery is also debuting Adams' new pieces at cosmetics giant Amorepacific's headquarters.

MASSIMODECARLO, which opened its Seoul studio earlier this year, is dividing its booth into three sections — one dedicated to the painter Shannon Cartier Lucy, alongside group displays of figurative paintings and abstractions.

Lehmann Maupin returns with a spotlight on four influential Korean artists whose careers are gaining international momentum. This includes Kim Yun-shin, featured in this year's Venice Biennale, Lee Bul, the recipient of the Met's 2024 Facade Commission, Do Ho Suh, who is being celebrated in a homecoming solo show at Art Sonje Center, and Sung Neung-kyung, who is set to have his first solo exhibition outside Korea in New York this October.

Other galleries with notable solo booths include Gallery Hyundai, showcasing Jeon Joon-ho in his first one-man presentation in a decade, Galerie Quynh, featuring Tuan Andrew Nguyen's sculptures made from brass artillery shells used during the Vietnam War, and Timothy Taylor, displaying Honor Titus' contemporary reinterpretations of Western portraiture as a subtle jab at social class and race.

The fair's two feature sections will return: Focus Asia, illuminating 10 groundbreaking artists introduced through emerging galleries from the region, and Frieze Masters, dedicated to art ranging from the Middle Ages and Renaissance to 20th-century masterpieces by Kim Whanki, Chang Uc-chin and Niki de Saint Phalle.

And throughout Frieze Seoul's run, two new large-scale sculptures by Choi Goen, winner of the
